



Irish Chamber Orchestra (ICO) directed by the very charismatic **Katherine Hunka** visits **Kilkee** (Clare), **Newport** (Mayo) and **Nenagh** (Tipperary) with another eclectic offering. *Americans & Bohemians* celebrates old and new music, popular tunes, and iconic works.

Katherine has been Leader of **ICO** since 2002 and has toured Europe, China, and Singapore to great success. Her 2020 CD of works by **Piazzolla** and **Schubert** with the **ICO** received glowing reviews. Katherine is known to engage with audiences throughout her colourful programmes.

Jessie Montgomery is one of America's fine young composers. **Irish Chamber Orchestra** performs her popular work *Strum* filled with rhythmic vitality which propels it from its nostalgic first moments to its ecstatic and dramatic ending.

Samuel Barber *Adagio for Strings* remains one of the most recognizable and best loved classical works. It was performed at Roosevelt's and John F. Kennedy's funerals and its enduring popularity saw it feature in movies such as *Platoon, The Elephant Man* and *Lorenzo's Oil.*

Before his collaborations with Hitchcock, **Bernard Herrmann** was already celebrated for his scores for *The War of the Worlds* and *Citizen Kane*. His *Psycho Suite* epitomizes suspense and terror. His inventive use of strings became a cliche for cinematic horror as **ICO** bring the shrills and thrills to life.

From America to Eastern Europe, Bohemia was the centre of music at the turn of the century. **Dvořák's** arrestingly beautiful **Nocturne** brims with dark harmonies creating a gorgeous nocturnal postcard. **Josef Suk** was 18 when he composed his remarkable **Serenade** in **E Flat Major**. It brims with youthful vitality as its ever changing moods bring the **Serenade** to a climactic conclusion.

Irish Chamber Orchestra (ICO) is renowned for its breath-taking performances that brim with verve and originality. ICO pushes the boundaries of what a chamber orchestra can do whether performing at *Electric Picnic* or *Mozartfest*. Don't miss an opportunity to hear one of Ireland's cultural gems perform at Cultúrlann Sweeney, Kilkee, St. Patrick's Church, Newport, Co. Mayo and at the Nenagh Arts Centre, Nenagh, Co. Tipperary on 22, 23 and 24 June.

Talk Title: Pilotage on the Shannon, near Past,

Present, and Future

Talk Description:

As an island nation, we rely on our ports to facilitate 95% of all imports and exports.

Ensuring the safe and efficient movement of ships in and out of our ports is the job of our Maritime Pilots.

Patrick's talk will be broken into three sections: the near past, the present, and the future possibilities.




Then, he will look at the possibilities of what lies ahead, from potential developments on the Shannon Estuary, to how shipping may evolve and explore the potential to see autonomous shipping on the Shannon anytime soon.

In the near past, he will be looking at developing critical infrastructures on the Shannon, like Moneypoint and Tarbert power stations and the challenges they posed to the Maritime Pilots who were on the Shannon at the time.

A River Pilot himself; Patrick will expand on the career path to becoming a Pilot, and explain why a Maritime Pilot is necessary and regarded as one of the most critical risk mitigation measures to ensure the safe movement of ships in and out of our ports. Not only will Patrick Galvin tell us all about the ships in Irish Waters, he will also speak about the various types of cargo that our local ports import and export.





About the Speaker:

Born and raised on the banks of the Shannon Estuary, in a village called Cappa, just outside the town of Kilrush in Co. Clare.

Patrick Galvin is a Class 1 licensed Pilot on the Shannon Estuary.



His seagoing career started in 1992 with Arklow Shipping.

In 1998 Patrick attended Cork Regional Technical College and attained his 2nd Officers Certificate.

Later, he completed Mate/Masters and Masters Unlimited certificates in South Tyneside College (United Kingdom) in 2002 and 2006.

While at sea, he worked for Arklow Shipping, P&O Ferries, and Stena Line, working in various roles on board up to the rank of Master.

Patrick Galvin became a Pilot on the Shannon Estuary in 2009.

In 2017 he was elected to the position of Chairman of the Association of Marine Pilots of Ireland; in 2021, he was elected Vice President of the European Maritime Pilots Association.

A proud Clare Man – Patrick Galvin is the first Irish Vice President of the European Maritime Pilots Association.



Talk Title: Forecasting Ireland's weather

Talk Description:

Michelle will give an insight into the world of weather forecasting at Met Éireann, giving an overview of some of Met Éireann's forecast products and services.



Met Éireann is the authoritative voice on meteorology in Ireland, its forecasts and warnings feeding into decisions that need to be taken by key stakeholders such as



airport authorities, county councils and in extreme weather, the National Emergency Coordination Group.





Michelle will give an anecdotal account of some extreme weather events that she's been on duty for. She has seen many advances in the science of forecasting over the past two decades and in the communication of forecasts and warnings to the general public and to the relevant stakeholders, which ultimately helps society to protect life and property.

About the Speaker:

A native of Tullycrine, near Kilrush, in west Clare, Michelle joined Met Éireann in 2005. Then following the completion of a master's degree in Meteorology in UCD, she took up a meteorologist forecasting position in the Aviation Services Division at Shannon Airport, Co. Clare. She has expanded her role down through the years to include general forecasting as well as aviation forecasting, and has been a TV broadcast meteorologist on RTÉ since 2016.



She loves the variety of her role, relaying the all-important weather forecast information to the general public and to aviation stakeholders and getting to work and live in both Dublin and Clare.

She will tell us about the original native Scots pines that still exist in the Burren as well as the butterflies there that occur nowhere else in Ireland.


The seabird colonies on the coast in high summer as well as the wildlife rich turloughs will be described and you will make the acquaintance of the fairy shrimp and the legless lizard.

You are in for a treat.




About the Speaker:


Éanna Ní Lamhna holds science degrees from UCD. Her thesis on the ecology of sand dunes and salt-marshes was published in the Journal of Life Sciences.

She set up the Irish Biological Records Centre in 1974 and is responsible for the original distribution maps of mammal and insects. She lectured post graduates on sustainability for 20 years in TU Dublin.





Her publications include a series of five studies on Irish Air Quality, eight books including Wild Dublin and her most recent – Wild Musings.



Éanna was President of An Taisce from 2004 – 2009 and was until recently President of the Tree Council of Ireland.





Éanna is a Judge of Environmental Initiatives undertaken by local groups on a county level such as Pride of Place.

A highly respected radio and television broadcaster on environmental issues; she has been an expert on the RTÉ *Mooney Goes Wild* radio programme since it began in 1995 and indeed is still the only female voice.

Alongside Derek Mooney, (Presenter), she is joined on the panel by colleagues Terry Flanagan, (Science & Wildlife Reporter), Niall Hatch, (BirdWatch Ireland) and Dr. Richard Collins, (Ornithologist).





She also appears regularly on Virgin Media's *The Six O'Clock Show* with an environmental and wildlife slot.

Included in "Irelands influential 100" list in 2012; she is a much sought-after speaker and lecturer and is a fluent Irish speaker.

About the Speaker:




This comprehensive and fully illustrated lecture looks back at a different time when going to the cinema was such a special treat.

The lecture is inspired by Joe Coleman's book

"House Full" which was specially written and independently published for Limerick's

National City of Culture in 2014. We meet the characters and well-turned-out members of staff that brought the

venues to life.




The Grand Central, The Carlton, The Royal, The Lyric, The City Theatre, The Tivoli, The Thomond, The Astor and a whole lot more.


We hear about the double features and the continuous shows, when

we often

stayed in the auditorium to see the whole programme again for the same price.

We learn about the unruly behaviour of some of the patrons of simpler times, the queue jumping and the ducking in without paying and the courting in the back rows of the stalls and balcony.







We also learn about the huge influence of the Catholic Church right up to the post war period. The 27week long Limerick Cinema Strike that went on from October 1951 to May 1952 in which 120 workers were affected and suffered significant hardship over the period.

The Savoy which was one of the finest cinemas in Europe, with its magnificent Art Deco design and its beautiful decoration throughout.





Its 1500 seats were filled to capacity every Sunday night throughout the year no matter what films were being shown, as tickets had to be booked in advance each week and almost always by the same patrons who considered the seats as their own.

It was a great era with simpler times that will never be repeated.

About the Speaker:

Joe Coleman comes from Thomondgate on the North Side of Limerick City, and is a second generation 'Soda Cake'.

Joe moved to Meelick, Co. Clare in 1986 where he lives with his wife Adalean.

He is a former cinema worker from his youthful days back in the 1970's when he worked in the old Savoy on Bedford Row in its final years as Limerick's best loved cinema then under the ownership of the great British Milling Company "The Rank Organisation".




Joe has spent over 39 years in public transport with CIE/Bus Éireann until his retirement in 2017. He has two great passions in life; cinema and Irish railways, both subjects which he has featured in different lectures around the Limerick area in recent years.



Continuing Professional Development is important to Joe who has completed a wide range of courses in different principles. He also has the 'gift of the gab' and is a Distinguished Toastmaster with Thomond Toastmasters Club in Limerick. Joe is also a Failte Ireland Approved National Tourist Guide.

Nowadays; Joe Coleman broadcasts a weekly show LIVE and Online titled: "Movies & Melodies".

The Rescue of the Leon XIII off Quilty in October 1907

Talk Description:

On September 26th 1907 the Leon XIII, a three-mast sailing vessel reached Cobh (Queenstown) after a voyage of 165 days from Portland, Oregon, U.S.A.

The Ship's Captain was given orders to proceed to Limerick and deliver the wheat to Bannatyne Mill.

The ship, which was built in Nantes in 1902, had a crew of 22 on board.

A violent storm damaged her rudder off Loop Head. She was blown northward by the force of the storm. The ship was sighted off Quilty on October 1st.

The Leon XIII struck the large reefs off Quilty and was split in two.

This talk will describe the brave and heroic rescue and its aftermath.

County Clare is set apart by the Burren, the Atlantic coastline, the Shannon Estuary and Lough Derg including our inland waterways, all rich in wildlife and their habitats.

These places have evolved over time through the interaction of man with the landscape.

Significant challenges to biodiversity are posed by a general lack of awareness; inappropriate development; lack of habitat management; climate change and invasive species.





We are now facing extinctions of wildlife on a massive scale including extinction of species in Ireland.

well as recent plans and policy and the results of surveys undertaken in the county.

At present; Congella is on a year's sabbatical from work with Clare County Council.




