

About the Speaker:

Paul O'Brien received his doctorate from the Department of History at Mary Immaculate College, University of Limerick, where he lectures in the Academic Learning Centre.

In 2019, he published a monograph based on his PhD thesis: The Glynns of Kilrush, County Clare, 1811–1940: Family, business and politics (Four Courts Press).

He has just co-authored a new book entitled 'Taprooms, Taverns and Alehouses: Limerick City Pubs, 1850-2024'. He is working on a new study about the suburban villas of Limerick City.

In 2016, Paul was a research fellow at Centre Culturel Irlandais, Paris. He is a member of the Council of Europa Nostra.

Paul is a recipient of the Military Heritage Trust of Ireland award for his research into recruitment practices during the First World War.

He has appeared on BBC and RTE television.









Talk Title: Are you being served?

The rise and fall of domestic service in Kilrush, Co. Clare

from 1881 to 1951

Talk Description:

The talk will explore the changes in society in Kilrush prior to 1881, which led to the employment of hundreds of domestic servants in the town.

Lisa will further examine the later changes which resulted in the disappearance of single servant households by the mid twentieth century.

The talk will expand on the lives, roles, and conditions of these domestic servants.

About the Speaker:

Originally from Waterford city, Lisa has been living in Kilrush since 1985.

Lisa has a BA in English and Ancient Greek and Roman Civilisations from NUI Maynooth, and more recently has completed a module of the MA in Local History from UL. This led to the publication of an article in The Other Clare (Volume 40) which forms the basis for this lecture.

Lisa is most interested in social history and the ordinary lives of ordinary people in the past. She is the Chairperson of the Kilrush and District Historical Society.

Talk Title: Remembering Kilcasheen: Co Clare

and the Frost Famine of 1740-41

Talk Description:

The Frost Famine of 1740-41 remains a shadowy episode in Irish history, despite being more costly of human life than any other event between the Cromwellian reconquest and the Great Famine of the 1840s.

It remains shadowy because unlike the Great Famine it is not well documented and the oral memory of its impact was lost over time.

The Famine was triggered by a series of weather anomalies that affected most of northern Europe, but the human impact of the strange weather was greatest in Ireland, with Munster and the south Midlands particularly hard hit.





Arctic Ireland: The Extraordinary Story of the Great Frost and Forgotten Famine of 1740-41 (Belfast, 1998).

There are several great monuments associated with the crisis still surviving in the Dublin region (on Killiney Hill and at Castletown), the result of privately sponsored relief works, but there does not seem to be a single monument or marker of the event in Munster, the epicentre of the crisis.

The small burial ground near here at Kilcasheen could be an exception to this, where we have unambiguous documentary evidence that it became an emergency burial pit in 1740-41. We will consider whether therefore

west Clare was particularly badly affected by the famine, and if so, why? But whether or not it was, the grave-yard at Kilcasheen can tell a far wider story.

About the Speaker:

David Dickson is Professor Emeritus of Modern History at Trinity College Dublin and has written very widely on the social and economic history of the Irish regions between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries. Major books include *Old World Colony: Cork and South Munster 1630-1830* (Cork, 2005); *Dublin: The Making of a Capital* (London & Cambridge, MA, 2014); and *The First Irish Cities: An Eighteenth-Century Transformation* (New Haven & London, 2021).

He has published a short history of the Frost Famine – Arctic Ireland: The Extraordinary Story of the Great Frost and Forgotten Famine of 1740-41 (Belfast, 1998).

Talk Description:

Renowned under-water cameraman and filmmaker, Ken O'Sullivan, will perform his unique live show INTO THE DEEP, outlining his incredible adventures exploring the North Atlantic Ocean, in Cultúrlann Sweeney.

The multi-award-winning Clare native will speak about his experiences exploring the stunning underwater world of the North Atlantic Ocean and encountering enormous whales and monstrous sharks.

Ken – who is also passionate about ocean conservation - will show videos and give insight and backstories into what it's like trying to navigate the North Atlantic Ocean to find and

film some of the largest animals ever to have lived, including blue and fin whales, the largest animals ever to have lived.

Ken will give a first-hand account of his unforgettable dive in 2016 when he was the first cameraman in the world to film and document a group of 35 thirty basking sharks engaged in a courtship ritual off the Clare coast.

The live show is a mix of film and stories from Ken's 18-year long career. He pays homage to his family's 250-year history on Fenit Island, Co. Kerry and the ancient maritime culture.



About the Speaker:

Ken O'Sullivan has been a documentary filmmaker, cameraman and ocean conservationist for eighteen years, producing natural history and creative documentaries all set in Ireland about the ocean, landscape and our ancient culture relating to these things in Ireland.

He has produced, directed and filmed natural history documentary series for RTÉ & TG4 and worked as a freelance cameraman / director for BBC NHU, CBC Canada, ITV and cinematographer for TV commercials and drama projects.

Ken is a passionate marine conservationist and heavily involved in conservation projects on sharks, skates and rays in Ireland, particularly in the highly unique Tralee Bay, Co. Kerry, where his family lived as fishermen and farmers for 250 years and where Ken spent the summers of his youth.



He works very hard to contribute to cetacean (whale & dolphin) research in Ireland and internationally, working closely with academic institutions and conservation organisations. He donated all of his work to education and his 2019 series Ireland's DEEP ATLANTIC is now part of the Junior Cycle Geography & Business Studies curriculum.

Ken's book: "Stories From The Deep" was critically acclaimed for its honesty and lyrical descriptions of our marine world.

Talk Title: Cappa to California, Swimming the Waters of the World


Talk Description:

Fionnuala grew up in Cappa, Kilrush where her love of swimming in the majestic River Shannon began. Blessed with stunning scenery around Cappa, her passion for swimming was fostered by the back drop of the Cliffs at Alyevaroo, Scattery & Hog Islands, looking across at Co. Kerry, with the mouth of the Estuary and Loop Head in the distance.



Fionnuala does not recall learning to swim:

"We just did, my two sisters and three brothers lived for our summers at Cappa. I grew to be an open water swimmer, though I never swam competitively as a child, or belonged to a club until much later, with Seaworld Masters in Lahinch, Limerick Masters and more recently Ennis Masters clubs."



lived and worked all over the globe and availed of any lake, sea, ocean or pool that she came across where she could swim safely.

Fionnuala had a childhood dream to swim the English Channel, in 2012 she made Channel Swimming history, but not in a way she would have wanted or ever dreamt of. In unprecedented circumstances her first attempt was aborted on safety grounds two hundred meters from the finish in France, because of a dense fog that enveloped the French coast line.

To quote: Channel Swimming and Piloting Federation, from October 2012:

"Real Heros Never Give Up"

When things don't go to plan, you have two choices: give up or try again. It's what one does with setbacks that makes us who we are, and this is where true heroes shine through.

This morning Fionnuala Walsh slipped into the cold Channel waters to complete her dream, which was dashed two months earlier by fog, a couple of hundred metres from French sand. She kept the swim low profile, but swam a brilliant swim today, and finished in 15 hours and 26 minutes.

Fionnuala is an example to us all. We all congratulate you wholeheartedly.

Surely the cruellest strokes of fate were reserved for Lucinda Bayliss, Colm Breathnach and Fionnuala Walsh. All three swam for 13 to 14 hours and were just a few hundred metres from the finish but none could land because the fog was so thick it was too dangerous to send them off towards the shore alone with a dinghy or canoe. Fionnuala returned on October 9 to cross in 15hr 26min. Hopefully, Colm and Lucinda will see it as unfinished business and will be back.



In this talk, Fionnuala will share personal insights of her many adventures, some heart-breaking moments, and entirely justifiable satisfaction with her success in Open Water Swimming over the last decades.

About the Speaker:

Fionnuala Walsh has competed in countless swims along the Wild Atlantic Way mostly in counties Clare, Cork and Kerry. Her first international swims were Malta to Gozo 2009 and Queen of the Sea Lisbon 2011.

Fulfilling a lifelong ambition; Fionnuala was the first individual from Co. Clare and 15th Irish Female to swim the English Channel in 2012. A swim known as: "The Everest of Open Water Swimming".

Following what proved to be a roller coaster journey, Fionnuala became the first Irish Female and 89th individual in the world to complete the *Triple Crown of Open Water Swimming* by successfully completing the English Channel 2012, the Catalina Channel 2013 and Manhattan Island Swim 2014.



In October 2015, Fionnuala set a new Irish record for the *Strait of Gibraltar Swim* (14.4 km) in 3 Hours and 30 minutes, an accolade she very much enjoyed until August 2023.

Together with Ned Denison and Liz Fry, both International Marathon Swimming Hall of Fame (IMSHOF), Fionnuala completed the first ever group marathon: Anti-clockwise around Anacapa Island (Santa Barbara, California 18km) in November 2016.




Nowadays, Ger Kelly is a Consultant Equine Surgeon at Fethard Equine Hospital. His work involves everything from routine to complex surgeries.

Ger Kelly attended the Boys' National School in Kilkee. He received his secondary education, as a boarder, at St. Flannan's College, Ennis, from 1981 to 1987.

Later, Ger undertook his studies in Veterinary Medicine at University College Dublin and graduated from there in 1992.

Returning home to Kilkee; Ger Kelly joined the local well-known Veterinary Practice: Nolan & Malone.

In those early years, his role was that of an assistant. After a few years, when Paddy Nolan retired circa 1995, Ger became a partner with Tommy Malone.

Forever in pursuit of professional development and excellence; in 1998 Ger Kelly became a Resident in Equine Surgery in University College Dublin.

At the completion of the Residency Training Programme, during 2002 / 2003, Ger was a Statutory Lecturer in Large Animal Surgery.

In 2003, after completing his Surgical Residency in UCD, Ger successfully passed the certifying examination and was awarded the *Diplomate in Equine Surgery* by the European College of Veterinary Surgeons.

His role at UCD necessitated him leaving the "home veterinary practice" in 2000. Then, he worked for a year and a half in Lisadell Equine Hospital in Navan. Subsequently; Ger Kelly joined Fethard Equine Hospital where he is currently employed.

which saw his eventual move to Carrigaholt as Parish Priest.


His courageous stand against poverty and disease is noteworthy. The idea for The Little Ark came out of the conflict during Father Meehan's famous six-year battle with Marcus Keane, while attempting to get a site for a Catholic Church in Kilbaha.

Onwards to the USA, fundraising for his new Church in Kilbaha, along with funding for schools, and his eventual death in Limerick in 1878.



He was a politician, a man of letters, a patriot, a leader in the Temperance Movement,

song writer, band maker & poet. These are just a few of this incredible man's achievements. However, he was, first and foremost, a man of God.

Born in Limerick; I became a Dentist in the late 1970s, when the only option at that time was emigration.


I moved to the lovely county of Hampshire in England and spent my whole professional career in the same practice for over 35 years.




